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The Road Ahead: Diane Gutierrez-Scaccetti

Last month, Commissioner Diane Gutierrez-Scaccetti rolled out her vision for staff on how she wants the NJDOT to be regarded internally, as well as externally, and articulated a plan to promote the myriad good works that go on at the NJDOT day in and day out. The Commissioner explained her vision—dubbed “Commitment to Communities”—town hall-style to a packed house in the cafeteria, as well as to employees located across the state through simulcasting technology. She said transportation is the one service that almost every resident of the Garden State uses daily. As such, the NJDOT plays a huge role in preserving and improving the quality of life for everyone who lives in the state and uses our transportation network.

“Commitment to Communities” began as a narrower initiative in 2018 to assist local governments in spending the substantial additional dollars directed their way because of the reauthorization of the Transportation Trust Fund. However, it became clearer throughout the course of the year that NJDOT has commitments to many communities around the state through the variety of work conducted by staff.

The Commissioner stated that NJDOT makes a difference to its external stakeholders, but it also makes a difference to staff. “To make a commitment out there, I along with senior leadership, need to make a commitment to you in here,” she said. To set the stage, Commissioner Scaccetti laid out a new mission statement for the Department, one that embraces “Commitment to Communities” by incorporating the multitudinous aspects of the agency’s work. “We must have a clear and encompassing statement that resonates with all our

constituencies, including our staff,” she noted.

She explained that she wants the Department to be inclusive of all the communities it serves by fostering good relationships, listening and being responsive, and by embracing the concept that NJDOT is a customer-service agency (see the last bullet on the new Mission Statement). To

accomplish this, the Commissioner articulated five key “values” that guide the Department’s mission and gave examples of work that fits into them.

The values are:

Inform: This value is exemplified by expanding our use of social media platforms to reach our various constituencies, training webinars for local officials applying for local aid grants, the imminent opening of the Local Aid Resource Center which will provide one-stop shopping for local governments with questions about grants-in-aid programs.

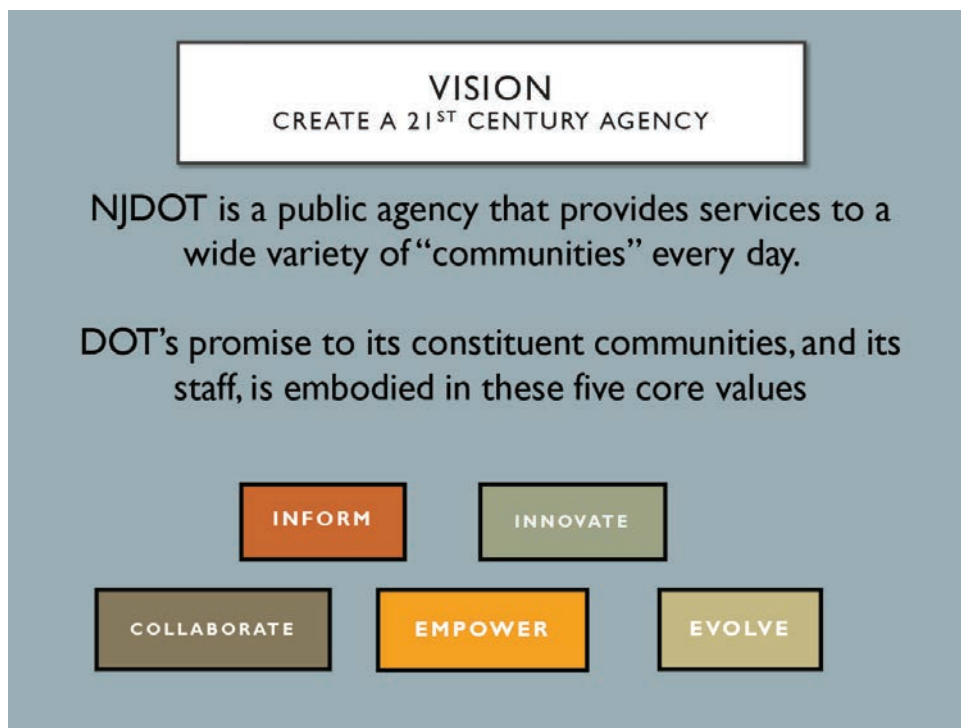
Innovate: A prime example is the new Project Management and Reporting System (PMRS), a technology that improves the

with County Engineers and regular meeting with stakeholders and partners. In addition, the NJDOT sponsors the TRAC & RIDES program administered through our Civil Rights and Affirmative Action unit that helps direct disadvantaged school kids towards careers in engineering and technology.

Empower: One of the best examples is the recently initiated Professional Engineering Design Experience program that is intended to pair senior level engineers with young engineers to afford them the hours of project design work necessary to sit for the professional licensing exam. Other examples are the Parole Re-Entry

program and our Summer Student Employment Program.

Evolve: NJDOT continues its major reorganization that began in 2018 by reducing the number of senior leadership from seven to four and by undertaking a program of staff augmentation to assist in keeping project delivery and key programs on track while younger staff develop.

“Everything that we do fits into these five values,” Commissioner Scaccetti said. “We’ve done incredible work over the last year.” The Commissioner cited the distribution of \$161 million of Municipal Aid and County Aid grants, the highest levels ever. Included were \$1 million each for Bikeways, Transit Villages, Safe Streets to Transit (important “quality of life” grants), \$30 million for Local Freight Impact grants (to make critical improvements to truck routes) and \$47 million in Local Bridge grants (for counties to maintain locally-owned infrastructure).

Examples of important statewide projects in 2018 that the Commissioner talked about were the Route 495 rehabilitation project in Hudson County, which is

rehabilitating the viaduct leading from Route 3 and the NJ Turnpike to the Lincoln Tunnel. She cited the kick-off of this complex project as a great example of planning and communication between partner agencies and local officials and police.

NJDOT opened a wildlife sanctuary on Cedar Bonnet Island in Stafford Township on what was a former dredge spoils storage site. This project was part of environmental mitigation for the larger Route 72 Manahawkin Bay Bridge project. This effort was a multi-agency partnership to turn fallow land into a nature habitat with a publicly accessible walking trail. Commissioner Scaccetti said this effort was another great example of inter-agency collaboration between NJDOT, NJ Department of Environmental Protection, the Federal Highway Administration, and the US Fish & Wildlife Service.

A key component of the “Commitment to Communities” vision is to promote the great work that the Department does daily. To achieve this, the Commissioner wants to take full advantage of social media platforms to tell

the Department’s variety of stories. She has put together a Communications Committee comprised of representatives from the major organizational areas who will work with the Office of Communications to identify interesting projects, programs and stories and to strategize about the best way to publicize them. “One thing we know is that social media allows us as an agency to tell our own narrative without the media and reach out to our constituent communities,” the Commissioner said.

Representatives on the Communications Committee are: Jim Berzok, Office of the Commissioner; Joe Dee, Capital Project Management; Meg Frampton, Transportation Operations Systems & Support; Teresa Manna, Finance & Administration; Veronica Murphy, Planning, Multimodal & Grants Administration; Jocelyn Juralewicz, Human Resources; Tonja Green, Human Resources; Zenobia Fields, Community and Constituent Relations; Glenn Catana, Graphic Designer/Communications; Danielle Calcagni, Social Media Coordinator/Communications; Stephen Schapiro, Media Relations/Communications. They will be steered by Mairin Bellack, Acting Director of Communications, and Judy Drucker, Public Information Officer.

“There is still much that I want to accomplish,” said Commissioner Scaccetti in conclusion. “I want to enable and nurture a young staff, continue to advance the Department through streamlining and reorganization, improve the way we inform the public and our stakeholders. I want to continue to build the culture at NJDOT so that we promote a team concept, develop loyalty, and attract and retain the best and brightest.” 

Womanspace, Inc. domestic violence support center featured at the March Women in Transportation event

On March 7, Commissioner Diane Gutierrez-Scaccetti addressed the attendees of the **Women in Transportation** event featuring [Womanspace, Inc.](#), a non-profit agency that serves the needs of domestic violence and sexual assault victims in Mercer County.

Commissioner Gutierrez-Scaccetti shared her personal volunteer efforts on behalf of Womanspace, Inc. and her devotion to giving back to the community through various organizations. The Commissioner expressed her feelings of enrichment through volunteerism, and her commitment to providing volunteer opportunities to NJDOT staff. "When you lay your head down on the pillow at night, you will sleep better knowing that in some small way you have made the world a better place," she said.

This event embodied the Commissioner's goal of creating an NJDOT environment that values, "giving, volunteerism and community building inside and outside of work."

Susan Adams, Volunteer & Community Outreach Coordinator for Womanspace, Inc., explained the history and mission of the group and discussed how Womanspace provides victims of domestic violence and sexual assault, their families and friends, community members, and other professionals with information and referrals from trained victim advocates. Spanish-speaking counselors and texting for the Deaf and Hearing Impaired are also available.

Womanspace, Inc. provides a broad array of services and support to victims including a Safe House for short-term emergency housing; Domestic Violence Victim Response Teams that are available to meet with victims at the time of an assault, 24-hours a day; trained sexual assault support advocates; and education and training.

Women shared personal accounts of their life-challenges and traumatic experiences in an emotional

video presentation that also highlighted the assistance they received from Womanspace. Messages of hope, showing that women can move from trauma victim to survivor when given the proper support, education and the opportunity to heal, punctuated the testimonials.

Professional Engineering Design Experience Program begins at NJDOT providing career opportunities toward licensure



Commissioner Diane Gutierrez-Scaccetti has launched the Professional Engineering Design Experience Program (PEDE) - an innovative initiative providing current NJDOT engineers with the opportunity to gain the required design experience necessary to achieve their professional engineering (PE) licensure.

Engineers expressed the desire to remain with NJDOT and needed the ability to obtain a PE license to reach career goals. The Commissioner understood the need and responded to employees with the development of The Professional Engineering Design Experience Program (PEDE).

"Good leadership is about listening to what our employees want and finding ways to encourage all employees to stay engaged in their work. I believe that the PEDE program is responsive to both!"

The PEDE program will offer engineering staff that have a bachelor's degree in engineering from an accredited university, who do not currently have design responsibilities, the opportunity to work alongside a PE-licensed colleague to gain the design experience required to obtain their own PE license while remaining on the job at NJDOT.


The PEDE program will build relationships between

staff members as mentors and mentees who meet the program requirements as outlined in the PEDE Program Guidebook.

Mentees will have the opportunity to design projects such as: crash cushions; guiderails; pedestrian improvements such as sidewalks and ADA curb ramps; minor intersections improvements such as turn lanes, minor widening,

corner cutbacks, signing and striping; sight distance issues/improvements; and minor drainage improvements through grading and re-profiling.

The program also creates leadership opportunities through mentorship. Having talented, committed leaders as mentors is critical to the success of the program. A good mentor will be a proven team player, have strong communication skills, and be a good instructor that is willing to encourage and support his or her mentee. Other requirements are outlined in the PEDE Program Guidebook.

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Data Visualization in Transportation

Communicating Transportation Findings and Plans: Charts, Renderings, and Interactive Visualizations

The NJDOT Bureau of Research hosted a half-day Tech Talk event on November 29, 2018 that featured research and innovative examples of data visualization methods being used by transportation agencies. Nathan Higgins, Cambridge Systematics, Inc., Matt Taylor, PE, Alabama DOT, Nick Johnson, PE, PMP, CPM, Nevada DOT, Christopher Pollard, Delaware Valley Regional Planning Council, Gabrielle Fausel, North Jersey Transportation Planning Authority, discussed tools, resources and best practices that they use to create visualizations to provide information to their constituencies. The event appealed to a wide audience apparent by the full audience in the NJDOT Multipurpose Room on November 29, 2018.

What is Data Visualization? The use of techniques that improve understanding by the public, elected and appointed officials, and other stakeholders of transportation plans and programs. Tools used for Data Visualization include modeling, animation, simulation, and virtual reality.

How does Data Visualization build stronger relationships with the public? Data Visualizations provide planners, designers and engineers with visual devices that help to communicate complex multidimensional information in a way that is comprehensible to a general audience. This visual component encourages collaboration, decisions that are more informed, fewer delays, and increased acceptance during the design and project implementation process. Visualizations can also improve understanding of the project among planners, designers, and engineers, improving cost effectiveness.

Expert Insights

Nathan Higgins, author of *Data Visualization Methods for Transportation Agencies*, a summary document of research conducted for the National Cooperative Highway Research Program (NCHRP), presented an overview of his [written report](#) and the associated website that provides guidance for the visualization process. He navigated the [website](#) to show examples of visualizations for transportation applications, chart types and software tools available, and data and style resources. He emphasized the importance of each visualization as a critical opportunity to communicate information, and noted that, although intensive work with data requires a specific skill set, visualizations are possible to create without elaborate tools and software.

Matt Taylor, PE, Alabama DOT presented various visualization methods, with an emphasis on reality mesh, renderings, photo matching, and animation to create 3D environments that bring transportation projects to life. Eighty percent of [Alabama DOT's](#) data visualizations are used at public hearings to help stakeholders understand projects and how they will fit into the community. Examples include a visualization that helped to explain a Divergent Diamond Interchange that creates a traffic pattern that is unfamiliar to most drivers. He noted that visualizations can provide models for contractors to use in planning, and can be useful for catching design problems. Taylor noted that there are often multiple conceptualizations over the design life of a project, for example, to present all the alternatives for a transportation project, and the details needed to support a preferred alternative, or to model the construction stages.



Nicholas Johnson from Nevada DOT explained how visualizations, including virtual reality simulations, are being used to build awareness and foster support by illustrating how completed projects may function and be experienced by affected communities.

Nick Johnson, PE, PMP, CPM, Nevada DOT, presented on “Interactive Visualization,” an emerging, virtual-reality-based mode for visualizing transportation projects. The Interactive Visualization innovation is a peer-selected focus innovation for the [AASHTO Innovation Initiative](#), which seeks out proven advancements in transportation technology to accelerate adoption by agencies nationwide. Mr. Johnson discussed the value of this technology in enhancing understanding of a transportation project during the public engagement process, which he stated is particularly important when communicating to Millennials and GenXers. Mr. Johnson gave an example of a Native American community that was concerned that a noise wall would block the rising sun from their view, preventing them from knowing the time for worship. The visualization alleviated the community’s objections by demonstrating that the wall would not block the sunrise.

Christopher Pollard, Delaware Valley Regional Planning Council, presented “Web Maps, Open Data, and more,” which described the data that the MPO has compiled for use in making regional planning decisions. He underscored the importance of accurate and reliable geospatial data as the basis for visualizations, and the MPO’s use of ESRI GIS mapping software to communicate this data. He discussed the datasets and interactive maps available to all the agency’s constituents, and provided detail on [Travel Monitoring](#) and [Philly Freight Finder](#). He mentioned that the initial development of the data required a significant investment of time in order to make the data accessible. He added that the MPO takes on a limited number of data visualization projects for their constituents.

Gabrielle Fausel, North Jersey Transportation Planning Authority, presented “Data Visualization in Transportation: GIS and Planning Tools at NJTPA,” and discussed NJTPA’s use of five visualization tools: [ViZtools](#) illustrates the various factors that support the Regional Transportation Plan; [NOTIS](#) shows how state and federal tax dollars are being invested in the transportation system in the NJTPA region; [Freight Activity Locator](#) provides an overview of goods movement activity in the region; [County Profile Application](#), a mapping tool, provides county-level demographic data for the region; and [Open Data Portal](#), which supplies publically available geospatial data. Ms. Fausel emphasized that the MPO made use of ESRI software that they had already purchased for other applications.



Great Concept but what about the Cost? In response to questions about the cost of creating visualizations, the experts stated that it depends on the project location, complexity, and the detail required to communicate information to the target audience.

A small Complete Streets project that is not very complex may take two weeks to finish and larger transportation projects may require multiple visualizations over the course of the planning and construction stages. Mr. Johnson’s public involvement events have offered an opportunity to use a driving simulator and Virtual Reality goggles, available through a contractor, to help immerse stakeholders in the experience of a proposed project.

Moving target The experts noted that they are always working to make the visualization process more efficient and enjoyable for the user. That includes constantly updating data and identifying gaps; assessing the data for reasonableness; requesting user feedback and providing references and disclaimers; and creating visualizations of uncertainty in data. Tools undergo internal and pilot testing before being released to the public; It is an iterative process where testing, applying and retesting tools is a part of the development process. When a Trooper sends an official email from the New Jersey State Police to an individual, typically it is something that becomes a cause of concern. In the report received by the NJDOT, it was a source of pride, gratitude and accommodation.

Bradley Dailey, Area 27 Supervisor, NJDOT Operations North, was driving in his state vehicle on I-80 in Netcong when traffic came to a stop. He saw smoke pluming in the air ahead so he put on his safety lights, drove up the shoulder and witnessed a passenger vehicle, Jeep, jammed under a tractor-trailer. After notifying Operations North of the incident, he exited the vehicle and approached the

Troopers on scene, I J. Siegel and Trooper I R. Coelho to determine if he may assist them. That action turned a deadly situation into a life-saving operation.

The Jeep driver was entrapped and flames began engulfing the vehicle. The Troopers pried the hood of the vehicle, which was covering the windshield, and were able to extricate the driver.

Others at the scene attempted to extinguish the fire but it was Bradley Dailey's efforts that turned the deadly situation

into a life-saving one. He was able to pull the engulfed vehicle out from under the rear of the trailer using a chain and the DOT vehicle.

The driver was airlifted to Morristown Hospital prior to being transported to St. Barnabas Hospital.

Detective I R. Hampp, New Jersey State Police, Fatal Accident Investigation Unit, wrote in an email to his superior, "With the position I currently have it is not often that I can assist in recognizing Troopers and civilians who have gone above and beyond."

The NJDOT senior leadership commend Bradley Dailey for his life-saving actions and for being another NJDOT Everyday Hero.

On March 21, 2019, NJDOT partnered with JA Inspire Trenton at The College of New Jersey where 700 Trenton middle school students participated in Career Awareness Day. Along with a coalition of educators and Trenton area industry leaders, over twenty NJDOT staff from Civil Rights, Local Aid and TOSS conducted presentations for the students.

Students had a blast during the two TRAC (Transportation and Civil Engineering) and RIDES (Roadways in Developing Elementary Students) demonstrations. 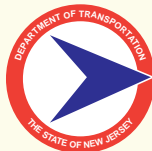

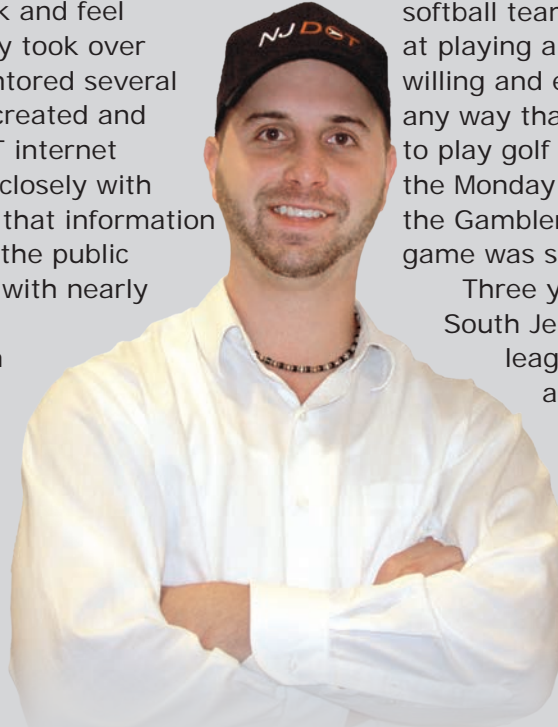
Obituaries
