Nation's largest transportation technology association honors NJDOT

The Intelligent Transportation Society of America (ITS America) recently honored NJDOT and the Turnpike Authority for implementing new technology that will improve traffic safety while helping New Jersey drivers avoid congestion and find more convenient travel routes.

Recognizing the NJDOT as a national leader in transportation innovation, ITS America President and CEO Scott Belcher presented NJDOT Commissioner **Jim Simpson** with the Smart Solution Spotlight award for the agency's use of innovative technology to provide New Jersey commuters with more accurate and timely information about traffic conditions, weather situations, and safety advisories.

Drivers on New Jersey's most heavily traveled highways can download a free smart phone application called Trumpit to receive audio-based traffic, weather and public safety alerts customized to their commute.

Shore projects meet milestones for summer traffic

The Route 37 over Barnegat
Bay resurfacing project, in Toms
River Township and the boroughs of
Seaside Heights and Seaside Park in
Ocean County, was completed in mid
May and all lanes were opened for
Memorial Day weekend. The
\$3.3 million project included bridge
deck patching and new asphalt
overlay for two miles on the Route 37

bridges over the Barnegat Bay from just east of Douglas Street in Toms River to Route 35 in Seaside.

A \$17 million bridge gate replacement project on Route 88 over Point Pleasant Canal in Point Pleasant Borough, Ocean County and Route 71/Main Street Bridge over Shark River in Belmar Borough and Avon-By-The-Sea, Monmouth

Construction crews have advanced work on both sides of the Route 52 Causeway, reopening two critical portions of local roadways that will provide increased travel capacity between Somers Point and Ocean City for the summer season. The reopenings will benefit residents, business owners and visitors as work on the \$400 million causeway replacement project continues through the summer and

In Ocean City, a second lane on 9th Street northbound has reopened between West Avenue and Bay Avenue and 9th Street will soon have two travel lanes in each direction with an additional center left-turn lane shared by traffic in both directions.

New Jersey ranked #5 as a Bike Friendly State

New Jersey moved up to fifth place this year as a bicycle-friendly state in the rankings announced in May by the American League of Bicyclists.

New Jersey was ranked #8 among all states last year. The new rankings were announced in May to coincide with the National Bike to Work Week. New Jersey retains its Bronze Award with the new ranking.

In 2008, the American League of Bicyclists launched the Bicycle Friendly State Program which ties together the League's advocacy work at the federal and community levels and recognizes states that actively support bicycling.

This ranking demonstrates the Department's commitment to safely accommodate cyclists on our roadway system. Our recently ranked #1 Complete Streets Policy reinforces that

In Somers Point, NJDOT reopened Shore Road to traffic. Shore Road had been closed at the MacArthur Boulevard (Route 52) intersection since late-March for the demolition of the Shore Road Trolley Bridge. The trolley bridge has been replaced with an at-grade roadway. In addition, two travel lanes are now available on Route 52

in either direction from the drawbridge through the intersection with Shore Road and Mays Landing Road.

These improvements, along with the two travel lanes being provided in each direction over the causeway and the bridges at each end, will improve traffic flow during the busy summer season.

"This application provides real-time traffic information to drivers on all roadways in New Jersey without having to take their eyes off the road," said NJDOT Commissioner Jim Simpson. "It discourages distracted driving and allows motorists to make better travel choices."

"Real-time traffic information is making life easier for commuters as a way to 'know before you go,' so drivers can make informed decisions and choose the most convenient and efficient route," said ITS America's Scott Belcher. "The NJDOT and Turnpike Authority are demonstrating how public agencies can deploy cost-effective technology solutions to reduce traffic congestion, improve public safety, and ease frustration for area residents and commuters."

Trumpit, developed by HNTB, allows drivers to receive real-time traffic alerts and other important public safety messages without having to take their eyes of the road. By downloading the free Trumpit app for their iPhones, Droids or BlackBerrys, motorists can receive audio alerts about delays on the Turnpike, the Garden State Parkway, I-80, I-78, I-287, I-295, the Atlantic City Expressway and the I-76/NJ 42 freeway. Motorists can tailor the alerts to their commutes by selecting the section of

highway and time of day they travel. The arrival of a new alert causes a tone to sound on the motorist's smart phone. By pressing a single button, the motorist can hear the full alert. Customers who want to use Trumpit must sign up for My511NJ Personalized Alerts at www.511nj.org.

"New Jersey has a very complex network of highways and toll roads that intersect each other throughout the entire state," said
