
ASCE names "Route 36 Highlands Bridge Project of the Year"

The New Jersey Section of the American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE) Board of Directors has voted to name NJDOT's "Route 36 Highlands Bridge over the Shrewsbury River" as the ASCE Section 2011 Project of the

The award will be presented to NJDOT in May.

This \$124 million project replaced the existing double leaf bascule Route 36 bridge over the Shrewsbury River with a high level fixed structure that was constructed with a slight shift in the alignment to the south at the channel but meets the existing alignment at the east and west abutments in Highlands and Sea Bright Boroughs in Monmouth County. The new structure eliminated or reduced many substandard features such as bridge structural deficiencies, substandard design features, vehicle and marine traffic conflicts. The bridge deck was also widened to provide for a center median and shoulders.

In 1851, she met fellow women'srights advocate Elizabeth Cady Stanton at the Seneca Falls Convention, and the outspoken duo began touring the country arguing the case for women's suffrage. In 1868 Anthony first published *The* **Anthony**

Revolution, a women's-rights

newspaper, and a year later she founded the National Woman's Suffrage Association.

Harriet Tubman, U.S. An escaped slave, she was the first woman

to lead a military expedition during the Civil War,

liberating more than 700 slaves in South Carolina. Tubman ended her life of activism fighting for women's suffrage in New York.

Milestone is reached in project to eliminate Marlton Circle

Route 73 overpass opened to northbound traffic

The New Jersey Department of Transportation recently announced a milestone has been reached in the ongoing Marlton Circle elimination project in Evesham, Burlington County.

The new Route 73 overpass that carries traffic over Route 70 opened to northbound traffic on Friday, March 18.

In addition, the left turn lane from Route 70 eastbound to Route 73 northbound was eliminated and replaced with a new traffic pattern using the right lane exit ramp to Route 73 northbound. Route 73 southbound will remain in the current traffic pattern.

The \$63 million interchange improvement project is eliminating the existing traffic circle and replacing it with a new overpass that elevates Route 73 over Route 70. The

two highways will be connected with new local exit and entrance ramps. The Marlton Circle elimination project began in April 2009 and remains on schedule for completion in winter 2011.


Two NJDOTers take the Polar Plunge
